

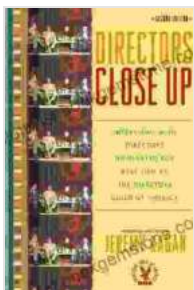
In Conversation: Interviews With Directors Nominated For Best Film By The Directors Guild Of America

Daniel Kwan and Daniel Scheinert (*Everything Everywhere All at Once*)

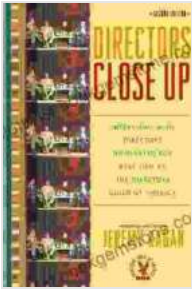

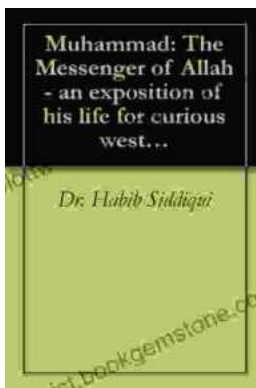


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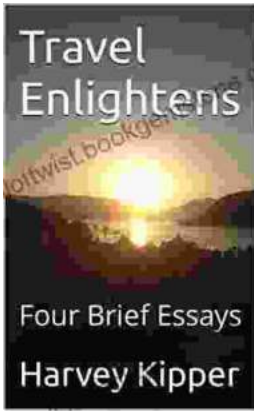
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
